Recycling Contamination Audit Complete-

In 2019, Washington Legislature passed a bill that will require counties with a population above 25,000 to develop a **Contamination Reduction and Outreach Plan (CROP)** in 2021. Although we currently do not meet the residential threshold, we chose to develop our plan sooner rather than later. We will be releasing details as soon as we have the data compiled and analyzed. These details will guide our decisions on the outreach plan.



Curbside Service Interruptions

Unfortunately, a few areas of our county have dealt with curbside service interruptions this year. August was no exception. Although recycling was the main program affected there were a couple of garbage routes affected too. Due to an increase in residential curbside recycling and trash pick-up, Republic Services has been dealing with a staff shortage. Equipment failures have also caused some delays for them. Their employees worked a lot of extra hours to pick up as much as possible. Drop off sites were offered in White Salmon on two Saturdays, and one Saturday in Glenwood, they also put out automated calls to the residents that were affected. If you did not receive a call please call their office to update your contact information so that you receive these important updates.

The Dallesport transfer station had some early closures in the month of August, which affected our county residents as well. These closures were due to large amounts of out-of-county trash as well as mechanical issues. The price for out-of-county residents has been increased to reduce the amount coming into our county as well as to make the price more comparable to other local areas. Be sure to have your proper Washington identification to prove residency upon request. More information on the price increase can be **found here**.
