

SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL

Generally, all solid waste is a possible source of much nuisance. Rapid, safe, and nuisance-free storage, collection, transportation, and disposal are vital concerns to all persons and communities. If the disposal of solid waste material is not carefully planned and regulated, it can become not only a nuisance but a severe threat to the health and safety of human beings, livestock, wildlife, and other biota.

A. Policies

1. The master program and use regulations should be consistent with the approved Klickitat County Solid Waste Management Plan, and regulations of jurisdictional health agencies.
2. Regulate sanitary landfills and solid waste handling in accordance with regulations of solid waste handling as adopted by Klickitat County. New regulations restricting sanitary landfills within any water course have been adopted by the Department of Ecology.

B. Regulations

1. Disposal sites are prohibited on all shorelines within the County.
2. All solid waste handling including, but not limited to, transfer stations, recycling, solid waste salvage and volume reduction shall not be permitted in any shoreline area. Permanent and long term storage of waste material within shoreline is inappropriate.
3. Solid waste shall not be disposed of in any shoreline area or into any stream or body of water.
4. Solid waste disposal facilities shall not be located within 200 feet of the ordinary high-water line of any waterway within the county.

5. Solid waste disposal use limitations in shoreline environments:

NATURAL-Prohibited

CONSERVANCY-Prohibited

RURAL-Prohibited

COMMUNITY-Prohibited

URBAN/INDUSTRIAL-Prohibited
