Substitute House Bill 1652

The legislature increased, without a vote of the people, retail sales tax on architectural paint by adding an assessment to the purchase price, costing \$6,000,000 in its first ten years, for government spending. This tax increase should be:

Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill 1873

Dallesport Fire District #6 Proposition No. 1

Proposition Authorizing Property Tax Levy Lift for Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Services. The Board of Klickitat County Fire Protection District No. 6, adopted Resolution No. 2018-10-10 proposing an increase in the District's regular property tax levy. The funds would maintain and improve fire protection, prevention, and emergency medical services, maintain vehicles and station facilities, and aid in training of personnel. This proposition authorizes an increase to the District's regular property tax levy from \$.368 to \$.90 per \$1,000 of assessed value to be assessed in 2020 and collected in 2021. The maximum allowable levy in 2019 shall serve as the base for subsequent levy limitations as provided by chapter 84.55 RCW. Should this proposition be:

Hospital District #2 Proposition No. 1 Levy Lid Lift

The Commission of Public Hospital District No. 2, Klickitat County, Washington (Skyline Hospital) adopted Resolution No. 536 concerning an increase in the District's regular property tax levy. If approved, this proposition would provide funds to replace and upgrade District medical equipment and facilities, including infrastructure improvements, and expand health care services. It authorizes a maximum regular property levy rate for collection in 2020 of \$0.68/\$1,000 assessed value. Such increase would not be subject to any time limitation notwithstanding provisions of prior ballot propositions. The 2020 levy amount will be used for the purpose of computing the limitations for levies in subsequent years. Should this proposition be:
